LIVING WATER

SCRIPTURE: Read John 4:1-26 to follow the encounter of Jesus meeting the Samaritan woman at the well. It is one of the many times Jesus uses something as common as water to make a spiritual point.

TEXT: John 4:10 "Jesus answered her, 'If you knew the gift of God and who it is that asks you for a drink, you would have asked him and he would have given you living water."

Early in March, I preached on this fascinating passage from John. It was very common for Jesus to use things like water, bread, salt, and light to compare essential material necessities to essential spiritual necessities. His whole point about not living by bread alone was to illustrate that we cannot content ourselves with material security. Our eternal security depends on God, who in his gracious love sent Jesus to become spiritual food for us.

Consequently, when we celebrate Holy Communion, we pray to the Holy Spirit that the bread and wine become for us the body and blood of Christ. It is in this manner, by the power of the Holy Spirit, that we enjoy the living water, the bread that does not perish, the wine that gives life. It is by taking Jesus into our bodies and thus our souls, that we become flesh of his flesh. And by so doing, we become with him the light of the world, the salt that gives flavor, the yeast that makes the bread delicious.

Making that connection between things ordinary and things spiritual is essential for our spiritual maturity. But like salt and yeast, we do not require it. Nor do we require great theological knowledge of how it is that we are made one with Christ.

Even those who have no ability to consider such mysteries, still may drink the living water and find salvation in Christ. I think of the mentally challenged and the young children who have not yet gained the ability to discern such things. Rather, in their own way, they simply feel God's goodness. No, the knowledge of the great mysteries preached by Christ was in order that we might grow richer in faith. It was so that some might become like Peter and Paul; some might even become leaders in the church able to satisfy the thirst and hunger of the people. What is essential is not knowledge. What is essential is Christ!

ILLUSTRATION

On the Sunday that I preached on the living water I did a magic trick for our children. Notice I said "trick." All magic is simply a trick. The vase that amazed our kids because it seemed to never run out of water, was just a trick. And the children will soon discover that for themselves. But like so many of the metaphors of Jesus, the bottomless vase was meant to make a point. Of course, I could have simply told the story of the woman at the well. But is it not true? How much more will the children remember the day in church when a vase never ran dry? And how much more likely will they then remember that Jesus will never let them thirst as long as they follow him? And in that sense, mystically if not magically, Jesus becomes for them the living water.

May your Lenten season continue to inspire you to be the salt, the light, and the life that gives life in Christ.

CALL AND RESPONSE

I think that most people do not fully appreciate the world of sound. People who share my health challenges learn to rely on sound for survival. To make a spiritual point, let me invite you into my world of sound.

During my bouts of insomnia, I am often awake long before sunrise. This is the time of day when it seems that every bird God has ever created is singing outside my window. This phenomenon, called the "dawn chorus" consists largely of male birds defending their territory and attempting to attract mates. Being unable to return to sleep, I go down to my kitchen to fetch a cup of coffee. As I do this, our elderly cat "meows" for his breakfast. It is interesting to note that adult cats make this sound only when interacting with humans. Scientists speculate that this is so because humans are unresponsive to the usual forms of feline communication such as facial expression and body posture. As the morning progresses, I often go out back to enjoy the sun. When I do this, I am often joined by our beloved dog who comes outside to lie on her blanket. When she does this, a squirrel in a nearby tree makes that chattering sound with which we are all familiar. Squirrels make this sound to warn other squirrels that there is a nearby ground predator. All these sounds are calls. A call is a form of communication designed to convey information and to elicit a response. The male robins are inviting the females to join them Our cat is commanding me to open his can of Fancy Feast. The squirrel is telling his comrades that great danger lurks in the Conery's backyard. As you know, we too are being called to respond.

I like to think of the Bible as the story of God's great call and the stories of the many ways in which people have responded. God called Moses and he responded by becoming the great leader of Israel. God called Mary and she responded by giving herself to the will of God. Jesus called his apostles, and they responded by leaving everything and following Him. The Risen Christ called Paul and he responded by becoming the apostle to the gentiles. That enduring call continues in our lives today.

I think that there are general and specific ways in which God calls us. All Christians are called to respond through musical and liturgical worship. In our personal lives, we respond through the spiritual disciplines of prayer, scriptural study, fasting and leading a life filled with selfless love. In addition, God calls us in specific ways which are related to our life circumstances. What follows is a short list for your consideration.

Many of us are called to respond through parenting. Parenting is God's great gift to children. Parenting is the means through which our children are supported and protected

physically, psychologically, and spiritually. Many of us are also called to care for our parents during their later years. Our parents cared for every need when we were young, and it is our honor and joy to care for them during the times when they need us the most.

We also respond to God's call through the jobs we do. We New Yorkers are forever grateful to the front-line workers who kept us safe and well fed during the pandemic. We are grateful to the police officers and firefighters who keep us safe daily. Our country needs nurses, teachers, crossing guards and Uber drivers. It turns out that we praise God as we work each day. There is no such thing as an unimportant job in the Kingdom of God.

We are also called to respond through stewardship. Our primary areas of stewardship relate to the domains of time, energy, and financial resources. We praise God in our use of free time. Some people are called to do volunteer work. Others are called to positions of church leadership. All Christians are called to keep in touch with friends, neighbors and fellow church members who are sick or homebound. We are called to be stewards over our financial resources. All Christians are called upon to contribute to the support of the church and its various ministry programs. Others are called to contribute to legitimate charitable causes. We are also called to respond through faithful stewardship over God's "good" creation. It is our duty to keep the world safe and clean for our children and grandchildren.

Beloved, as the season of Lent progresses, let us be mindful of the many ways in which we are being called to respond to God's great call.

CCOB & EWC LUNCHEON








